## NOTE *from the* PASTOR



“And when you fast, do not look dismal, like the hypocrites, for they disfigure their faces that their fasting may be seen by men. Truly, I say to you, they have their reward. But when you fast, anoint your head and wash your face, that your fasting may not be seen by men but by your Father who is in secret; and your Father who sees in secret will reward you.”  
(Matthew 6:16–18)

Lent places before us a demanding but liberating call: fasting and abstinence. In a world trained to indulge every appetite immediately, the Church teaches us to say “no” — not because food or comfort is evil, but because our souls must govern our bodies, not the other way around.

Fasting is not about minimalism for its own sake. It is training. When we willingly embrace hunger, we discover how often we eat not from need but from restlessness. When we abstain from meat, from unnecessary luxuries, from constant stimulation, we strengthen the will. Discipline grows. Clarity grows. Freedom grows.

This is how virtue is built—through repeated, concrete acts. You cannot become patient without resisting impatience. You cannot become chaste without governing desire. You cannot become holy without self-denial. Fasting is necessary for virtue.

Done faithfully, it strengthens the interior life. But Lent is not merely private struggle; it is also communal renewal.

On March 3, at 6:30 p.m., we will gather for our Musical Oratory of Lent at Old St. Mary— an evening that draws the heart upward through sacred music and meditation. It is a fitting reminder that discipline is not dour; it makes space for beauty.

On March 19, we celebrate the ninth anniversary of the establishment of the Cincinnati Oratory on the Feast of St. Joseph. St. Joseph is the model of disciplined silence, steady work, and faithful obedience. His hidden strength built the Holy Family. May his example strengthen our own resolve this Lent. We will have a Solemn Mass at 6:30 p.m., at Old St. Mary.

Finally, on March 25, we celebrate the titular feast of Old St. Mary, the Annunciation of the Lord. Solemn Vespers will be held on Monday, March 24 at 6:00 p.m., and Solemn Mass on Tuesday, March 25 at 6:30 p.m., followed by a social. The Annunciation reveals the highest fruit of discipline: Our Lady’s fiat. Her “yes” was possible because her heart was already ordered to God.

This Lent, let us fast with purpose. Let us abstain with intention. Let us grow in discipline so that, when God asks something difficult of us, our answer—like St. Joseph and Our Lady—will be ready and firm: Fiat.

### Triduum Schedule April 2-4

The Triduum will be held at Old St. Mary. On Holy Thursday, Solemn Mass will begin at 6:30 p.m. followed by watching at the altar until midnight. On Good Friday, the Mass of the Pre-Sanctified will begin at 12:00 noon. Confession will be heard from 9:30 a.m. until 10:30 a.m., and Stations of the Cross will be at 11:00 a.m. The procession with the recumbent Christ will follow the noon liturgy. Tenebrae will take place at 6:30 p.m. and last two hours. On Holy Saturday, the Easter Vigil will begin at 2:00 p.m. Please remember that the Easter Vigil lasts about 5 hours. Please note that we are following the Traditional Holy Week this year, in effect before 1955. The times for these Masses and Liturgies are reflective of the rubrics of the time.

**Please note: First Friday Mass and all-night Vigil are cancelled on April 3 due to coinciding with Good Friday.**

## Carmelite Corner

*Praised be Jesus Christ!*

We hope that you are having a grace-filled Lent/season of the Great Fast. The East speaks of the “bright sadness” that pervades this time. The sadness and compunction which spring from love and the desire to love more perfectly. For Who is more lovable than God? Yet we so often fall short of loving Him and our neighbor.

This is a great season to sort through our storehouses- the storehouse of our heart and to remove whatever hinders our union with Him and gets in the way of our friendship with Christ. Whether it is pride, holding on to grudges, a lack of forgiveness or mercy, attachments to things or positions, or fear in trusting, etc. As Holy Father St. John of the Cross said, it does not matter whether a bird is fastened by a chain or a slender cord, it shall still be tied down and unable to soar. This is a season for renewal and great joy! It is a season where we realize how much we were (are) loved and a chance for us to begin again—to “love better” in return, to attach ourselves to God and be freed from what holds us back.

St. John Cassian wrote that, “Fasts and vigils, the study of Scripture, renouncing possessions and everything worldly are not in themselves perfection, as we have said; they are its tools. For perfection is not to be found in them; it is acquired through them. It is useless, therefore, to boast of our fasting, vigils, poverty, and reading of Scripture when we have not achieved the love of God and our fellow men. Whoever has achieved love has God within himself and his intellect is always with God.”

A sign that we had in the novitiate oratory reminded the novices (from all over the world) of the words spoken to St. Catherine of Siena by our Lord: “I ask you to love me with the same love with which I love you. But for me you cannot do this, for I love you without being loved. Whatever love you have for me you owe me, so you love me not gratuitously but out of duty, while I love you not out of duty but gratuitously. So you cannot give me the kind of love I ask of you. This is why I have put you among your neighbors: so that you can do for them what you cannot do for me—that is, love them without any concern for thanks and without looking for any profit for yourself. And whatever you do for them I will consider done for me.”

Let us go forward together in this great season of joy and repentance! Let us hold nothing back and love in truth both God and neighbor. You are in our prayers and we are grateful for yours! Thank you for helping us to change this world—one heart at a time... beginning with our own.

## Musical Notes

We are very grateful for the excellent attendance at the Shrovetide Concert put on by the Oratory Singers and the children of *Laudate Pueri*. Pflieger’s short and heartfelt Passion was moving for performers and attendees alike. We are plotting a “pop-up” performance of this work in a public space around town sometime before the end of Lent, so stay tuned, especially if you missed us the first time!

Tuesday, March 3, at 6.30 p.m. at Old St. Mary, is our Musical Oratory of Lent. The Choir of the Cincinnati Oratory and the Parish Orchestra a new setting of the Seven Last Words by Sean Connolly, OSM Director of Sacred Music, as well as the *Stabat Mater* of Liechtensteiner composer Josef Rheinberger, a devout Catholic whose heartfelt music marries the technical perfection of earlier masters with the expressive power of a 19th-century Romantic harmonic palette. This combination is perfect for setting these moving texts. *Reflections on the Seven Words* by Ven. Fulton J. Sheen will be presented together with the music in a devotional context.

We already buried the *Alleluia* & retired the *Gloria* during Septuagesima, and now we see removal of flowers from the altar & the silencing of the organ as a solo instrument during Lent, until the veiling of images and silencing of the *Gloria Patri* during Passiontide, and the complete absence of the organ even for accompaniment from the *Gloria* of Holy Thursday to the *Gloria* of Holy Saturday. It is as if all of these adornments were in place only to set us up to experience their absence, to underline the enormity of Christ’s Sacrifice, and to make viscerally real to us the experience of His death on the Cross.

The monumental liturgies of Holy Week will soon be upon us. If you’ve never made a full set of *Tenebrae*, consider joining us at Sacred Heart on Wednesday and Thursday of Holy Week, and for the final night at Old St. Mary on Good Friday, which will feature a full set of polyphonic responsories sung by the Oratory Singers, and the famous *Miserere* of Allegri in the liturgical context for which it was written. The liturgies of the Triduum are the culminating point of the whole liturgical year—attending Sunday Mass without ever attending the Triduum is, in terms of the symbolic and ritual language of the rites, rather like trying to read a secret code without using the decoder ring.

Musically, the greatest treasures of the Church were composed for these days, and, in addition to the jewels in the crown of Gregorian Chant, you will hear the *St. John Passion of Victoria* on Good Friday, as well as his *Improperia*, and on Holy Saturday, the monumental *Missa Papae Marcelli* of Palestrina. We hope to see you there!
